Forklift License Surrey - Getting a forklift license or forklift certification within North America will require the one training to perform classroom instruction in addition to hands-on training. The provincial, federal and state regulatory bodies are responsible for the training, licensing and certification for powered industrial truck operators. Operators could get a license either through training administered by the employer or by a third party. In any case, regulatory requirements need to be met. Recertification is required every two to three years.

The forklift is a powered industrial machine that is designed along with many options, like for instance stand-up and sit down models, propane and electric versions, and a wide variety of types and sizes to meet the industrial needs of workers. Operator training courses are normally individualized to address the particular uses and types for which the operator is training. Training on a gas-powered, sit-down lift truck inside a warehouse setting will not be the same as training on a propane-powered, stand-up lift truck in a shipyard. The different forklifts and their applications makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all businesses and equipment. Regulatory standards, hence, have a tendency not to focus on particular program requirements but instead on the results of individual training programs.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common method for operators to be given their forklift certification or license. This particular method of certification needs the employer to provide practical training and classroom sessions on equipment in the workplace. Employers can opt to train personnel on each and every type of forklift separately, or to train them on all machines combined. The course incorporates forklift operation procedures, safety measures, company regulations and lift truck maintenance. Topics specific to the worksite, like for instance dangerous conditions or materials, should be included. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely utilize and operate each type of lift truck on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor normally requires an on-site component along with hands-on practice.

It must be noted that certifications provided by an employer do not transfer from one employer to the next. Receiving a lift truck license through employer-provided training permits the operator to run a forklift for that employer only.

The most significant factor of lift truck license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements differ from one kind of machinery to another. Safety problems differ from industry to industry and from employer to employer. Both third-party providers and employer-provided training might have to address additional requirements for safety training in applicable industries, like in marine and offshore operations.
